It is a common misconception that Puerto Rico doesn't pay federal taxes.



Residents of the island generally do not pay federal income taxes, but they do pay:

- Medicare
- Social security
- Self-employment
- Unemployment
- Customs
- Merchandise taxes

All of them added up to \$5.14 billion dollars in 2023.




DOES PUERTO RICO REALLY NOT PAY FEDERAL TAXES?

Twenty-eight jurisdictions have a net deficit per capita with the federal government. Nine of them have a greater per capita deficit than Puerto Rico.

Puerto Rico is poorer than all of the states in the United States. While its residents contribute a significant amount in federal taxes, they do not receive the same federal benefits as their state-side counterparts.

- EITC, Medicare, and Medicaid: with spending cap
- SNAP vs NAP: \$1.6 billion less for nutritional assistance
- SSI: excluded from participation
